BROUGHTON COMMUNITY AND SPORTS ASSOCIATION



BCSA is a registered charity made up of volunteers from Broughton. Our aim is to improve community health, physical activity and social cohesion. We do this by supporting local community groups and organising local events.

Despite lockdown restrictions we helped to deliver some fantastic community initiatives in Broughton. In June we supported Broughton Town Council's scarecrow competition to improve morale during the COVID pandemic. BCSA wanted to make the event as inclusive as possible by giving free bales of hay to residents so they could join in too. We gave residents the opportunity to donate money to a local cause during the hay bale collection, and in total

residents collectively donated £135 for The Health Tree Foundation. All the money raised was used to purchase items from the Amazon wish list for patients and staff at Scunthorpe General Hospital.

Over the summer we ran the Community Lockdown Champion Awards, enabling our community to show their support to some amazing people that have gone above and beyond during the pandemic.

Every year the charity aims to improve social cohesion by hosting community events for residents. Due to the current COVID pandemic, we could not do this. Instead, we encouraged residents to connect virtually via our Facebook page "Christmas tree" competition and spread a little cheer with our Community Secret Santa Event. The aim was to spread positivity and improve wellbeing. Generous donations from Co-Op, Tesco and Morrisons meant that we were able to give away more prizes to residents, some of which were gratefully received. 60 residents took part in our Secret Santa event and we donated mince pies to Wells Court, Carseld and Castlethorpe Nursing home.

We are now turning our attention to 2021. We are kicking off this year by bringing back the Broughton Bulletin, which we hope will allow Broughtonians to stay more connected, get involved in community events and allow local groups to share their information with residents, not on social media. We are also working on some exciting spring and summer activities for the community, including an Easter Raffle to raise money for the Broughton Wombles, visit <u>thisisbcsa.co.uk</u> for more information.

BROUGHTON ALLOTMENT & LEISURE GARDENERS ASSOCIATION

Broughton Allotment Association was formed in 2007 by plot-holders with the aim of creating a community-based organisation representing the interests of fellow plot holders and local gardeners. Run by volunteers from the allotment - with the officials and committee being elected at the AGM – the Association aims to provide a friendly and sociable environment so that plot holders and local gardeners can share advice, expertise, seeds, plants and produce. It also sells discounted bulk buy allotment supplies.

The Association runs a number of events throughout the year including open days, garden visits, attending local shows and cookery demonstrations. Information* on events can be found in the quarterly newsletters, Facebook page and website.

Currently membership of the Allotment Association is £3.50 per annum and is open to any plot holder or local gardener. A new tenant gets a year free membership with a welcome pack when they sign up with the council, which illuminates all key areas concerning getting started.

BROUGHTON WALKING GROUP

The group is run to encourage walking for health in and around Broughton. We run a combination of health walks (3 miles / 90 mins duration) and longer walks approx 6/7miles for those who like further distance.

Walks are held on a Wednesday and occasional Saturday and vary between Broughton based (local woods / river) and local destinations which may involve a short car journey. Where possible there is the option of refreshments on completion of each walk by prior arrangement.

We have fully trained walk leaders who are also compliant in first aid . The group is friendly, sociable and aims to walk at a pace that slightly raises the heart rate. Currently all walks are suspended due to Covid 19 but updates will be communicated when able to restart.

BROUGHTON DRAMATIC SOCIETY

Broughton Dramatic Society is an amateur dramatic group which performs two plays per year at the Village Hall. We are a registered charity that aims to make dramatic arts accessible to all and to promote and improve wellbeing, through high-quality performance. As part of our charitable focus, we often give out free tickets to deserving causes; we support, for example, our local pensioners' group.

We have been fundraising over the past few years so that we can renovate our rehearsal room, located behind the church. We have recently been able to connect to a fresh water supply and our aim now is to fix the roof. We are hopeful that, thanks to the generosity of the community and grants from Broughton Town Council and North Lincolnshire Council, work will start on the repairs later this year. Last year, due to COVID restrictions, we were unable to perform any plays. Instead, we moved online, putting out videos and hosting an online quiz night via our Facebook Page.

In 2021, we are hoping, finally, to be able to bring our performance of 'Haggard' to the Village Hall. This play is best described as a bawdy romp and has had us all in stitches from the get-go! Perpetually hard-up, lecherous, conceited, dishonest and drunk, the eighteenth-century Squire Amos Haggard was first conceived by Michael Green and subsequently brought to television screens in Eric Chappell's much-loved ITV series in the 1990s. In Chappell's stage adaptation, our anti-hero disguises himself as the notorious bar brawler 'One-Eyed Will', seduces a member of the aristocracy, poisons himself, survives an encounter with 'Death', fights a duel and ends up in prison waiting to be hanged! His son Roderick and servant Grunge are his not-so-faithful companions. It's a fast-moving, hilarious script and we can't wait to bring it to the Village hall! Watch this space for news of its performance in November 2021, fingers crossed!

BROUGHTON IN BLOOM

The group was started approx 4 years ago to introduce floral displays at strategic areas in Broughton and Wressle. Several raised beds have been set up in locations to give maximum effect to residents and visitors. Bulbs have been planted on the grass bank opposite woods on Ermine st, top of Church wall on High Street and also outside the library to give spring colour. There is also a communal herb garden outside the village hall for all to use. 2 recently created wildflower beds are now maturing in the church yard and Church Lane graveyard.

The group of volunteers has worked with Broughton community groups including W.I., Primary school, St Hughes school, Allotment association, Brownies, Guides, Toddlers, Wells Court and Church.Funding is provided by volunteer donations and local council support. In 2020 Broughton won best kept small town and cemetery awards in the North Lincolnshire area.

PURPLE POLIO 2020

In 1979, Rotary International began its fight against Polio, immunising 6 million children in the Philippines. In 1985 it launched Polio Plus, joining forces with WHO and UNICEF in 1988. The Poliovirus mainly effects children under the age of 5 years old. Since 1985 over 2.5 Billion children worldwide have been immunised against the Poliovirus, with only 121 cases remaining worldwide as of 30th Sept 2020, these being in only 2 countries; Pakistan & Afghanistan. Africa was declared Polio free in August 2020 after no cases of "wild polio" in the last 4 years. Rotary adopted the slogan "Purple 4 Polio", highlighting the Campaign by planting purple crocuses.

The permanent global cessation of circulation of the poliovirus is the aim of a multinational public health effort begun in 1988, led by the World Health Organization (WHO), the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) and the Rotary Foundation, when at the time there were 350,000 cases in 125 countries

BLOOMIN WOMBLES

It has now been a month since the inception of Bloomin Wombles, it has shot up from zero to 80+ in a month. We are a group of like minded people who care about our community. The original idea was to support the Broughton in Bloom team, contribute to and enhance their great work.

We have great community support as well as from North Lincs Council who have supplied PPE, Equipment and waste collection. Our Wombles are regularly stopped from their work by the public and praised for their efforts. It is heartwarming to see Broughton residents pulling together with a common goal x (any suggestions will be accepted) anddd... not forgetting our Junior Wombles 20 plus which makes us a Hundred strong

BROUGHTON RUNNERS

During the first lockdown we started workout sessions to help people stay motivated, but other than that our runners have been keeping themselves busy with virtual challenges. We have anywhere from 15 to 50 people taking part for each challenge. The challenges have been made up of mileage targets and group mileage targets (where everyone clubs together to hit the mileage). There is also a single distance challenge where you have to run a set distance in one run and also an elevation target where you have to hit the amount of elevation in a set period.

Not all challenges have been completed just for fun though, with one of those challenges generating £80 for Lindsay Lodge Hospice. Then of course we have the Brutaliser which has allowed people to have the feel of an event without breaking any COVID guidelines. This year we are planning the return of our annual Broughton burn in September, watch this space.

BROUGHTON LADIES COUNTRY CLUB

Broughton Ladies Country Club has been running for over 60 years. Ann Smith is our hard working secretary and Jan Foster is the President of the club. We hold monthly meetings on the first Monday of the month (except bank holidays) in the village hall back room. The meetings are held in January, February, April, May, June, September, and October. During March the club usually runs a trip to the local theatre and therefore there is no meeting that month. During July and December we usually go to a local restaurant for a meal. Our November meeting is in the hall and is usually a pie and pea supper or a buffet supper. January is our AGM. We do not usually have a meeting during August. At each meeting Ann arranges for various speakers from different occupations and charities. We charge £2:00 for each meeting which includes a cup of tea or coffee and biscuits. This fee covers the cost of the hall hire and a small donation to the speakers choice of charity. We also hold two coffee mornings during the year, one in July and one in November, this fund raising is vital to the club and again we hope to start them again soon.New members will always be made welcome, and we look forward to seeing you. As with many organisations we have been hit hard due to Covid restrictions and are looking forward to a time when we can meet up again. We now have a Facebook page and we will be posting updates on this in the very near future so please check it out.

The Show was started in 1945 by four farmers, J Wells, F Knapton, W Golland and C Green. The Gymkhana was held in a hay field adjacent to the playing field which was specially cut for the day and used until 1975. This was then amalgamated into the present field by the Playing Field Committee who ran and organised the events such as cricket and football. The Show Ground uses all the playing field on Scawby Road, Broughton for the show, which is with the kind permission of the Broughton Town Council. The grass area is flat which is ideal for the Horse Showing and Jumping, Horse Drawn Vehicles, Children's Entertainment, Dog Show, Trade Stands and the Craft Fair which is held in the hall. New features which include Heavy and Agricultural Horses and Shetland ponies have recently been introduced. BROUGHTON THROUGH THE YEARS

Below is a photo of the Broughton Rangers FC of a century ago (1920-21)

They are pictured with the J Hett Charity Cup which they won that season, their first trophy success in a decade. The trophy is still played for today, in fact the current Broughton Working Men's Club footballers are the holders.

They were:

Back: C Wells, G Dinsdale, F Stothard, C Nixon.

Middle: C Young, J Quickfall, J Markham, H Boulton, C Sherwood, A Codd, J Bones, J Wells, J Wells. Front: B Skelton, J Johnson, T Ayre, H Hare, J Green.

The photo is taken on the recreation ground in Broughton, outside the British Legion Hall erected shortly after the Great War. In the back ground the Charabanc was used to transfer players and supporters to games, it was owned by Jim Wells.

The previous season, neighbours, Brigg Town beat Broughton, 2-1, in extra time in the first round. This time they got revenge in taking Brigg out by the same score in a first round replay, following a 1-1 draw at Broughton.

The local Scunthorpe Star newspaper claimed "Broughton's record gates were broken" during the drawn encounter. It was likely that more than 1000 people were watching the game on what is now the current recreation ground and the local newspaper the Scunthorpe Star showed quite a lot of interest in the hostile Broughton crowds. A number of complaints were to be registered to the Lincolnshire Football Association, including during the Junior County Cup Match against Scunthorpe Liberals.

The newspaper correspondent continued to show a great deal of interest in Broughton and was less than impressed that Sherwood had been dropped for Boulton, under the Pseudonym 'the watcher' they felt sure that Sherwood would appear in another teams colours before the end of the season.

By the time they reached final, which like many matches of the time, went to a replay, Sherwood accompanied Boulton alongside Skelton in the half back line and helped Broughton to a 4 - 2 win against Winterton.

The team captain Charles Nixon was presented with the cup by Mr A.A. Rhodes and the large concourse of Broughton Supporters carried him down the town holding it aloft. This was the start of a sweep of 22 trophies in 10 years.
