## **Broughton in Bloom**

The volunteer group continue with their work maintaining the beds around the village. The bedding colour theme this year is red, white & blue in line with queens diamond jubilee anniversary. New features this year are a charity wishing well currently under construction at village hall gardens (all Labour and materials sourced by volunteer donations), a low maintenance / water saving bed of grasses outside Dog & Rat, a reclaimed penny farthing sited & planted up at end of Greyfriars Rd & a first attempt at a Union flag under the Broughton sign outside cemetery. Thanks for help with funding to both Broughton and North Lincs councils and a special thanks to the folk who give their free time to look after the beds all year round. Our final addition to this years planting is the last remaining phone box in Broughton on Brigg Rd. A joint effort between Town Council and the Bloomers has created a fantastic display to the previously unloved kiosk

## **Broughton Runners**

It's been a busy time for the runners club. At the beginning of the year we launched our New England Athletics-affiliated section of Broughton Runners called TeamBR. This has been well received and now has 30 subscribed members. The club has a focus on trail running and holds regular away days in the peaks.

At the beginning of this year, we launched our couch to 5k course aimed at getting more people into running. The course was successful and everyone who took part completed the 5k at the end of the course! We have now launched a 5k to 10k training program for those people who have already completed the 5k but want to progress up to 10k in a controlled manner.

Going forward we are anticipating starting a children's run coaching course through the summer holidays aimed at ages 8-11. On top of that, we have the Broughton Burn fast approaching in September, for which we will be needing volunteers. ## **Egdon Community Fund**

A new community fund is being launched in Broughton to support local charities and community organisations.

Egdon Resources, the company which operates the Wressle oil site, is to team up with the Broughton Community and Sports Association (BCSA) who will run the fund on behalf of the company and its partners in the Wressle site. The Egdon Community Fund aims to pump considerable funding into local community initiatives whilst the nearby well site operates. The site is forecast to last for up to 15 years and this year will see around £100,000 committed to the fund.

Egdon's managing director Mark Abbot said:

"The Egdon team and our partner companies, Union Jack Oil and Europa Oil and Gas, are looking forward to working with the BCSA which, as an established local charity, has the existing infrastructure to get funds to where they are needed.

"The fund is designed to make a positive difference to Broughton and its residents. We would encourage local groups to get their bids in!"

Egdon has already started to support local initiatives.

So far, the fund has received applications from organisations such as community fun runs, the Broughton Wombles litter pickers, a local pre-school and the Broughton show. The fund also paid for the new beacon used in this year's Jubilee celebrations.

One of the applications Egdon was particularly keen to support was the local Scout group who lost their hut in a fire in February. The hut, which had been the base for the group for more than 30 years, was razed to the grounds, and damage was also caused to the nearby storage lockup.

The Scouts needed support to clear the site removing four tonnes of debris and securing the lockup with new doors after they had to be cut open by the fire service, in order to move gas bottles to safety.

Egdon donated £3000 which enabled the Scouts to have all the debris removed, the site levelled and the lock up secured.

# **Egdon Community Fund: How to apply**

To apply for part of the funding you must apply directly to BCSA. Applications will only be considered from the following:

- Community groups, activities, or events in the parish of Broughton.
- Groups must have a governing document/constitution.
  - Groups must have their own bank account
- Groups must be voluntary/not for profit. (We cannot accept applications from businesses)

There are three funding windows available throughout the year.

- 1. 1st September 2022 to 31st December 2022
  - 2. 1st January 2023 to 30th May 2023
  - 3. 1st May 2023 to 31st August 2023.

This year, Egdon will make available around £30,000 for each funding window. The remaining £10,000 will be held by Egdon for any applications that do not meet the above criteria and will be available at any time. Funding decisions will only be made once the funding window has closed, applicants should not expect a decision to be made prior to this point. Applications will not be accepted outside of these windows.

Applicants will be invited to submit the attached grant form by the closing date of each window.

## L.I.V.E.S: A Summer To Remember

Summer has well and truly arrived, and the team have already been busy at a host of local shows. For the first time in 2 years, the LIVES team are very excited to be getting out and about across Lincolnshire. From Scunthorpe to Surfleet we have events all over the county and we can't wait to see you. If you are out and about keep your eyes peeled for our stand you never know what you might learn. It could be that you want to know a bit more about the history of LIVES, what it is that we do, what we are going to do in the future, or it may be that you want to learn Bystander CPR so you know what to do if you ever find yourself in a situation where you need to use it.

Local LIVES Responders Bob Wilmot, Emily Grills, and Sean Code have been teaching this essential lifesaving skill to pupils in local Primary Schools including Broughton Primary School, inspiring the next generation of lifesavers. We welcome any opportunity to pass on our skills to othering in the communities we serve, together making our communities safer.

Every year LIVES Emergency First responders like Bob, attend thousands of 999 medical emergencies, and being based in the local community means that they can attend quickly and start delivering lifesaving medical interventions such as CPR and defibrillation which is crucial if someone has suffered a cardiac arrest. Last year LIVES launched its own critical care car that is based on the East Coast. Medic 50 is manned by volunteer medics who are on duty from 8 until late to attend to serious medical emergencies where people are furthest away from a critical care facility. Like all LIVES Responders, they do this in their own time, volunteering for the good of the county when they could be home with their loved ones.

We can only continue to be there in a 999 medical emergency with the support of people like you. LIVES Responders are entirely funded by the generosity of the people of Lincolnshire, and we can only be there for you, if you are there for us. From running the London Landmarks Half Marathon to taking part in a wing walk, to hosting your own cake sale, or a dress-down day at work, your support helps us be there for you when you need us most.

## **Broughton Jubilee Library**

Situated on the High Street in front of the Village Hall, we are a community-based library run entirely by volunteers. We provide a very wide range of reading materials for adults, young adults, and children. These include audio books, large print books, fiction, and a large selection of non-fiction books covering a wide variety of interesting subjects. As we are part of the North Lincolnshire Council library service you can also request books from any other library in North Lincolnshire free of charge. There are free facilities for printing and photocopying if you are a library member. There are notice boards full of local events and information, some with takeaway leaflets.

A recent addition is a display case housing a collection of artifacts found by an experienced metal detectorist in the Broughton area who wishes to share these with the community of Broughton. These artifacts have no intrinsic value, but they are an interesting insight into the social history of Broughton.

Every summer we hold a children's reading challenge between July and September, free for any child. The theme of the challenge this year is Gadgeteers - focusing on science and innovation. Once a child signs up for the challenge they get a reward each time they read a book and tell a volunteer about it. This year there are stickers/pencils/paper games and bookmarks for those aged 4 and over. At the end after reading 6 books, they get a medal and certificate. There is a separate mini challenge just using stickers for children under 4.

As we are solely dependent on the kindness of our volunteers, sometimes the library has to remain closed because there is no one available to man it. It doesn't happen very often but when it does it can cause inconvenience to you, the customer. We do our utmost to open but sometimes it is just impossible. ## **Broughton Cricket Club**

The Cricket Club have had a very busy first half of the season.

The first team would like to of won more games but the competition is tough in Lincolnshire League Division One and our position of 5th in the league is probably a fair one at this stage.

The second team have been in fine form for most of the season. Thanks to the first fruits of our improved junior cricket system a number of 15/16-year-old lads are really taking the Lincolnshire County Cricket League Division Three West by storm. Samuel Hayton is the most economical bowler in the league whilst Jack Johnstone is racing away with the most wickets in the division. As things stand the team are second, although with Barton Town having two games in hand they would be set to take a sizeable league. However, the team beat Barton in the Cup Semi-Final and they still have them to play twice so all is set for a big finish to the season. Their final is at Hirst Priory, Crowle on Sunday 14th August so support for that will be much appreciated. Our third team is, unfortunately, propping up the North Lindsey League Division Two but they have been a real success. They have been fielding sides with as many as 8 or 9 under 16s in it. It has been a fantastic achievement to bring so many young players into the senior game every weekend.

Our Junior sides have had a very busy season. Our Under-16s have won 7 out of 9 games. Whilst we have introduced our sizeable under-13 squad to a mixture of 8 a side pairs cricket and for the first time 11 a side standard cricket. They have played 25 matches in total across both formats, with some rained off and others still to be played over the summer holiday period. We have also introduced a number of new players into our under-11 side which has had a decent season in the North Lincolnshire League.

Last year, for the first time in our history we integrated a women's softball team, they entered into a competition this year, the East Midlands Women's Cricket League. They train on Thursday nights from 7.30 pm till 8.30 pm on the Recreation Ground as well as hosting a festival on 11th September. We have also started a girls' softball section which also trains Thursday evenings (6.30 pm till 7.30 pm), from which it is hoped we may be able to sustain a bigger Women's section in the years to come.

Finally, our Allstars (5-8-year-olds) and Dynamos (8 to 11 years old, softball) groups have been very well attended and we hope to organise some games for the older ones in the coming weeks as well as our end-of-season presentations. Keep an eye on our socials for more info.



# The Broughton Allotment & Leisure Garden Association

## Life in Broughton (1922) by Neil Simpson

In the absence of Council Minute books thought I'd take a look through the newspaper archives to try and get an incite into life in our town, then a small village. In those days Broughton had an Urban and District Council, responsible for much of what is covered by the local authority in today's age. Was there a social life? Yes, it revolved around sport and dancing with a smattering of social gatherings thrown in. Let's take a look........

## **Spring**

The local pump was found to be "defective" during the first meeting of the Broughton Urban and District Council. Kicking off a year in which discontent seemed to be the order of the day. Mrs. Spillman (Broughton Vale) entertained the 'scholars' with tea and games in the memorial hut.

Whilst the Women's Institute entertained the 'over 80's to tea. All the men were presented with a pipe each, and the women with Oranges and sweets. Girl Guides presented the women with 1/2lb of tea. Jack Kendall (Soon to be Everton and Lincoln City) kept goal in fine fashion putting in a superb display as Broughton Rangers defeated Brigg Town in a crucial top three clash in the North Lindsey League in front of a "moderate attendance of 400 spectators" on the recreation ground in Broughton. Former Scunthorpe Utd Right Winger Frank Hollin capitalised on a miskick in the closing stages to seal a 3-2 win (Ayre and Evans were the other Broughton scorers). Ayre made it 19 for the season, Hollin 12, they had scored 53 goals in 19 matches to this point (Late February). Only Ashby Mill Road stands between Broughton and a league championship win.

The Newspaper reports various parties including a Fancy Dress Ball where Mr. Sherwood won first prize for his Charlie Chaplin costume. The Earl of Yarborough unveiled our War Memorial in which he declared his immense pride that he was able to unveil something that will stand alongside the Anderson Chapel which his ancestors built many years previous.

George Spillman presided over a meeting of the Broughton Nursing Association in the memorial hut. Nurse Joyce has been in the parish for 10 years and is "highly esteemed for her help and great kindness". Broughton Rangers hosted the first Broughton Nursing Charity Cup Final since Scunthorpe Juniors won the cup in 1914-15. 700 spectators witnessed a score draw between Broughton Rangers and Ashby, in the replay the following Wednesday Broughton, thanks to a hat-trick by Frank Hollin won 5 goals to nil to collect the trophy. Broughton Rangers did in the end win the North Lindsey League and were considered the best and most consistent team in the district.

The Urban and District Council, Messrs Adlard, J Spillman, Hogg, Stothard, Bowers and Stephenson presided over the first discussions to install a telephonic system in the village.

### **Summer**

Broughton's first match in the Dinsdale Cricket League resulted in a comfortable win against Scunthorpe Town 2nds. Fred Lowe and Frank Hollin shared 5 wickets a piece to bowl Scunthorpe out for 63 before Hollin (11), Charles Parish (19), and JW Green (14) took the away side to victory finishing all out 85.

Broughton beat Winterton by 7 runs in the Dinsdale League whilst on Whit Monday a JE Kitchen XI (142 for 6) from Brigg comfortably beat the Broughton side (All out 26) Fred Lowe took 7 for 12 and Frank Hollin 3 for 15 to dismiss Messingham for 27. Brigg duo JE Kitchen 59\* and Jack Goates (50\*) both of whom play for more Senior club teams (Brigg Town) and both of whom represented the county later in their careers racked up in excess of 200 runs in response.

Roads appear to be the issue at the July council meeting. The Brigg to Winterton road was repaired with tarred slag, the Brigg Common Road was tarred, and the county council contributed £3500 to the repairs on the Scunthorpe road, likely to be the bottom half of Mortal Ash Hill as we know it today. The councilors of the day wanted to try and disband the Urban and District Council in favour of Brigg RDC taking it over. The chair felt this would not be supported by any party.

A bus taking the Broughton Cricket Club to play out at Grimsby Clerks broke down whilst traveling through Brocklesby Park. The opponent's ground wasn't reached until after 6 pm. A" strike encountered on the return journey" meant they didn't return to Broughton until 2.30 am.

Late in August Jack Goates made another appearance – this time scoring 102\* in a Dinsdale League game vs Burringham. Broughton made 194 with Frank Hollin also contributing an unbeaten half-century. Fred Lowe had taken 8 wickets for 4 runs as Burringham was dismissed for just 20 in the first innings.

Broughton Rangers, missing several of their best players (presumably through Harvest or Cricket) hammered Brumby 5-3 in the opening game of the 1922-23 season in the North Lindsey League.

Roads were still very much the topic of discussion at Council in August. Scawby Road and Brigg Road had been partially repaired at a cost of £177 (roughly £11000 in today's money according to google)

#### **Autumn**

Women's Institute met in mid-September in the rectory Barn where Mrs. Phillipson gave a recitation and Monologue. There was a satisfactory evening "tripping the light fantastic" in the memorial hut thanks to the Piano Skills of Mr. Hobson (of Scunthorpe). The Broughton Rangers Reserve side exited the McLean Charity Cup at the hands of Barrow Haven reversing last year's (1921-22) fixture.

Harvest Festival was celebrated at the Church which was magnificently decorated. There was strong opposition to the proposed de-urbanisation of the Broughton Council. The issues surrounded Mortal Ash Hill road and its links to the Broughton village. Mr. Chapman argued the road should be treated as the main road and as such would receive funding from the county council. Mr Adlard continued the argument and said that the road to Broughton was no worse than that which heads towards Twigmoor from 'Motlash'. There were also issues surrounding sanitation. Dr. Glegg queried that in 1913 ten samples from the town pump were taken and 8 were found to be contaminated, whilst the only other towns in Northern Lincolnshire that had its own water supply was Ferriby and Ulceby. The refuse was left to be dumped in people's own gardens.


John Kelley (of Glasgow) was arrested in Broughton on account of begging – when sentenced to one-year imprisonment he asked if they 'could make it two'.

#### Winter

Broughton Rangers received a string of telegrams through, cancelling matches. Albert 'Checker' Codd was selected to play as a 'half back' in the North Lindsey League team that played against the Lincoln League. Ashby Mill Road knocked Broughton Rangers out of the Lincs Junior Cup inflicting a 5-3 defeat on them. The Red Lion Dividend Club met with Mr. Glover presiding. With 146 members, Mr. Weston as secretary, they declared a dividend of 14s 3d.

On Christmas Day Broughton Rangers played Brigg Town at the Memorial Field, despite holding the visitors '2 all' at halftime they ended up losing 5-3. The following day (Boxing Day), Brigg Town continued their fine holiday form beating Rangers 3-1 in the return fixture at the Manor House Ground. Both matches were played in front of more than 1000 people.
